"Creating Solutions, Changing Lives," is the Easter Seals motto, but it could just as well have been written to describe the life of Anastasia Keller-Collins, Sr VP of Programs at Easter Seals Hawaii. Anastasia is a recreational therapy graduate of San Francisco State University and also has her master's degree in special education with an emphasis on autism. She will soon become a board certified behavioral analyst, having completed an intensive certification program this past summer. Anastasia has devoted her life to helping

people with special needs. Her work helps people with disabilities become independent. She is most inspired when a client is able to say "I did it myself." When asked to describe her, a seasoned therapist said, "Anastasia is an incredible leader who has an amazing ability to empower individuals. She truly accepts people as they are and tirelessly teaches and guides others....her contributions to the field of disabilities are enormous."

Anastasia also serves on the Hawaii State Council on Developmental Disabilities appointed by the Governor and is a National Adult Day Health Centers of Excellence coach helping programs in other states.

Her genuine heart transcends her personal and professional lives and is evident in the comments from her children. 20 year old Brandace says, "...I can tell her anything because all she has is unconditional love...she teaches us that if you are honest, kind and respectful, people will always want to help you." Her self-proclaimed "perfect" son, 21 year old Brooks describes her as "the type of mom who is supportive no matter what you choose to do. The lessons she has taught me in life I will carry with me forever, such as: being respectful, approaching everything with an open mind, free of judgment." Watson says, "Even though I am extremely sketchy and got some serious issues, she still puts up with me and loves me dearly. I had a hard life but I can't be any happier living with my new family. I love my new big sister, Pua. I'm sorry for biting you. And I'm also sorry for killing Chewy." The most telling comment is that, "Mom gets along with all our friends because she is so "chill", but still is able to say, "You make sure you are home by curfew!" Keep your anti-virus, anti-spyware software up to date. Microsoft has free all in one software to protect your PCs called Microsoft Security Essentials (MSE) that can be downloaded free.

Another easy implementation is to change our wireless connectivity to

WPA2 if using older technology like WPA or WEP. Most of us use wireless routers or some 802.11b, 802.11g or n device to connect our home computers to the internet. WPA2 is the latest standard and provides stronger data protection and network access control by introducing new encryption protocols like TKIP and AES.

Never underestimate how malicious internet predators can be. We use the internet to purchase things, to pay bills, and to communicate. Be smart, it will go a long way in insuring the safety of you, your family, and your friends.

Firewall: A device or softwarebased program designed to permit or deny network transmissions based upon a set of rules.

Malware: Malicious software used to disrupt or deny operation, exploit information, or gain unauthorized access to a systems resource.

Phishing: A way of attempting to acquire sensitive information such as usernames, passwords and credit card details by masquerading as a trustworthy entity in an electronic communication.

Spyware: A type of malware that collects small pieces of information about users without their knowledge. Information used to learn habits of users activity and in many cases disrupt their browser activity.

WEP: Wired Equivalent Privacy, a security algorithm for IEEE 802.11 wireless networks. Intended to provide data integrity similar to that of traditional wired networks.

WPA/WPA2: Wi-Fi Protected Access I and II, security protocols and certification programs developed to secure wireless computer networks. A sucessor to the previous and less secure system known as WEP.

Teamwork Wins!

The delegates to the 2011 ABWA National Women's Leadership Conference were honored to have Cary Mullen, Olympian and Word Cup Downhill Champion share his secrets to winning. "Teamwork Wins" is one of his 5 Winning Secrets. Hmmm, but isn't he an INDIVIDUAL downhill skier? He didn't compete in a team, right? So why would an individual competitor emphasize teamwork?

Cary explained that, "...You can try to do it all by yourself, but I guarantee that you'll be more successful if you leverage the talents of others you can save time and energy and improve your own results surround yourself with the right people who can help you to stay motivated." He spoke of the importance of what he calls "training partners." These are people who either have similar goals or are capable of assisting you in some way to achieve your own goal. These people will give you honest feedback and help you to see problems and solutions from a different perspective. In sports, these people may be coaches, teammates, physical therapists. In other areas of our life, training partners

can be financial advisors, spiritual leaders, and workplace mentors. Cary says, "It is so much better to win with a team than to win alone. In fact, I think the good life is really about winning together."

He emphasized looking past the obvious weaknesses of others and to find their hidden strengths instead. Learn from them so you can benefit from the diversity of your team. Remember that if everyone were just like you, you would have nothing to learn! The following is an excerpt from his book, How to Win, Achieving Your Goals in Extreme Conditions: "... Adopting a more appreciative attitude reduces the anger, frustration and confusion that can arise in perceiving differences as weaknesses. Such an attitude also fosters the ability to see the unique brilliance in everyone. When you can leverage that brilliance to help improve your own performance - wow-it is amazing! As a further benefit, your relationships in general become stronger because you can genuinely respect and appreciate others and celebrate our differences."

Cary challenge: Think of a person who is currently driving you crazy. First, make a list of their obvious weaknesses. Now make a list of their outstanding strengths. Persevere through the second, harder list. Make



a third list outlining what you could learn from this person. Think about how you could learn from and make use of their strengths to better yourself.

Cary closes his book by saying that "what I know for sure is that our lives are about our relationships. They are our truest form of connection, purpose, and sense of immortality. Without meaningful relationships, a truly winning life is impossible."


- All members will serve as goodwill ambassadors for the American Business Women's Association.
